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


What Are You Saying? Working with Court Interpreters



Steve Lindeman has been a Field Manager with the Citizen Review Board for almost ten years, reviewing thousands of cases of foster children in various counties around Oregon. Steve was a key member of a multi-disciplinary team in Multnomah County focused on the issue of psychotropic medication and foster children. The work of the team contributed to significant improvement in DHS administrative rules regarding management of psychotropic medication in May 2007, and a change to state law regarding psychotropic medication and foster children in May 2009 (implemented 6/30/10). Prior to working with the CRB in the Judicial Department, Steve worked for nine years as a counselor/therapist and clinical supervisor treating children with serious mental health and behavioral problems in residential treatment. This gives him a unique and powerful perspective combining legal, policy, and clinical aspects of child welfare issues in general and psychotropic medication use with children.

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Seantel Heisel, EBI Coordinator and Field Supervisor, Oregon Youth Authority

Seantel Heisel's career spans 25 years experience in the juvenile justice and child care system. Ms. Heisel has held various direct care and administrative positions throughout her career. She started her career working with pre-school aged children with disabilities, providing skill development to prepare them for integration into main stream educational setting.

In 1986 Ms. Heisel discovered her passion for working with at risk youth and made a career shift into the juvenile justice system. Her initial position was with Marion County as a juvenile detention relief staff and intern juvenile probation officer. In 1987 Ms. Heisel accepted a position with Catholic Community Services where she held a variety of positions including Youth and Family Counselor, Program Coordinator, Youth and Family Therapist, Program Manager and Director of Youth and Family Programs. In these positions Ms. Heisel worked closely with Children Services Division, courts, state and local mental health divisions, juvenile departments, and citizen review boards statewide, providing interventions for youth and families.

In 1997 Ms. Heisel joined the Oregon Youth Authority team as a Field Manager. She provided supervision in a variety of counties including Linn, Benton, Lane and most recently Marion. This year Ms. Heisel accepted a Community Services Manager position and is providing operational oversight statewide for the OYA. During her tenure with the OYA, Ms. Heisel has participated in a variety of local and statewide executive boards and councils concerning best practice in juvenile justice, public safety, and mental health services. Ms. Heisel was one of the initial members on the OYA/CRB State Team that was statutorily charged with developing the process for review of OYA cases. Ms. Heisel is still on this team and is currently the OYA chair.

Tom Carranza, Field Manager, Citizen Review Board

Thomas C. Carranza has worked for the Oregon Citizen Review Board for more than twenty years. However, five of those years Mr. Carranza was appointed by DHS Child Welfare to oversee the State of Oregon Child Welfare compliance to a Voluntary Compliance Agreement mandated by a Civil Rights Compliant filed against DHS Child Welfare.

Prior to coming to the CRB, Mr. Carranza worked for Oregon Child Welfare as a Management Analyst for 8 years. He was one of the architects of the administrative review process mandated by the federal legislature's passage of The Adoption and Child Welfare Act of 1980. At that time the reviews, now conducted by the CRB, were conducted by child welfare supervisors. Mr. Carranza conducted branch audits of each of the branch offices of child welfare throughout the state to determine compliance to the federal and state laws and policies now monitored by the CRB.

Prior to being appointed to the Management Analyst position in the Child Welfare Central Office, Mr. Carranza worked for the Oregon Youth Authority, then called Juvenile Corrections. Mr. Carranza held a number of position in Juvenile Corrections including: Management Analyst, Cottage Manager at MacLaren and Diagnostician at MacLaren. He also coached football and basketball at MacLaren when MacLaren Lord High School was a member of the COSCO Conference.

Mr. Carranza has also conducted cultural competency assessments and training at the local, county, state and national level. Mr. Carranza co-authored a manual, "Implementing Cultural Competency", which was award a Multicultural Diversity Award Honorable Mention by the National Association of County Boards.

Erin White, Field Manager, Citizen Review Board

Erin White is the Citizen Review Board Field Manager for Baker, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, and Wallowa Counties. She is new to CRB and has held the position since December 2009.
