

2021 Through the Eyes of a Child Conference Evaluation

Of the 78 attendees at the 2021 Through the Eyes of a Child Conference, 17 completed an online evaluation, for a response rate of 22%.


The results of the evaluation are summarized below:




Respondents were asked to indicate their level of agreement with three statements regarding the Through the Eyes of a Child Conference in general. The graph above indicates the percentage of respondents that agree or strongly agree with the corresponding statement. 94% of respondents thought that the presenters were knowledgeable about their topic areas.




Respondents were asked to identify how many years they have presided over juvenile dependency cases. A combined 70% indicated they have presided for less than 10 years.



Respondents were asked to rate each conference session on a scale of 1 (Poor) to 5 (Excellent). These responses were then averaged for each session. The averages above exclude respondents who did not respond to the question. The Appellate Update had the highest average score (4.5).



Respondents were asked to rate their experience registering for the conference and their overall online experience during the conference, on a scale from 1 (Poor) to 5 (Excellent). All four measures received an average rating of 4 or higher.



Respondents were asked to rate their overall experience at the Through the Eyes of a Child Conference on a scale from 1 (Poor) to 5 (Excellent). A combined 59% of respondents gave the conference a rating of 4 (Very Good) or higher. 24% of respondents indicated that the conference was excellent (5).

What Topics or Format Changes Would You Like to See at Future Conferences?

- We will get the hang of this remote conferencing! but I would like less breaks and get done early if we don't have the content. Breakouts worked well.
- I would like more substantive law and practice and less about Covid and remote hearings. Maybe domestic violence and dependency.
- Less reading of cases.... Walk the Judges through a Dependency Case
- Topics that are directly elicited from all judges that would be helpful in daily practice. Less panels. More factual info.
- An in-person format is always preferable as it provides opportunities for interactions among judges that just don't happen in a virtual setting, even with the chat room feature.
- It's hard to respond to this question because I assume, we'll be in person (hopefully!) for next year's conference. Regarding the Model Court Team presentation, my reaction was that there was a little too much "dependency 101" (which should be its own presentation for those who feel they need it) and not enough "here's how you pull a model court team together and sustain it."
